

From the Mayor's Desk

We have recently discovered that your May newsletter was probably not delivered due to a new process being followed at the Post Office. If by some miracle, you did receive one, a lot of this information will look familiar! But it has been updated to fit more with July instead of May.

With the inviting weather, it's hard to not want to go out and enjoy the great outdoors. I've been doing some exploring around the surrounding neighborhoods to seek out trails. There's a few right outside Glenaire. The newest one, and the one still in development, is right outside the new Homestead subdivision. If you take the Campbell Road bridge (by foot of course), there's a new walking bridge to the left that crosses the creek. Though the trail is just gravel and grass right now, you can take that to Buckingham Drive and walk north up to Smiley St to cross back into Glenaire. Depending on where you live in the city, it's about a mile and a half loop.

There are two more walking trails within walking distance of Glenaire, both are toward Canterbury. One is a half mile linear trail called the Wilshire Park Trail and the other is a two-mile loop called the Westboro/

Canterbury Greenway. You can find these and others under the Parks & Trails map on Liberty's website.

Do not forget about the Glenaire city park either! Right on Kirkland, it's our peaceful nature nook. There are two large grassy areas perfect for burning off the energy of young kids. There's a walking bridge and trails with several varieties of trees. With everything green and full, it's hard to forget we're in the middle of a city.

Taking the dogs for a walk is the highlight of their day, and hopefully yours. Amidst the joy, be sure to clean up any messes left behind by our furry friends. It's a small but essential gesture to preserve the cleanliness in shared spaces and shows respect to fellow walkers.

Please be mindful to keep your grass mowed. Our ordinances state to keep your property maintained and you can receive a nuisance complaint on the following: a. noxious weeds and other rank vegetation, grass and weeds eighteen (18) inches or higher; b. accumulation of rubbish, trash, refuse, junk, building materials, metals, or other things; c. any condition which provides harborage for rats, mice, snakes, and other vermin.

Back to School

Can you believe it? It's already time to kick off another awesome school year! As we get ready to hit the books, let's go over some super important safety tips to make sure everyone stays safe on their way to and from school.

Bus Stop Safety

- **Be Early**: Get to the bus stop at least five minutes before the bus shows up.
- Stay Back: Stand a few big steps away from the road while you're waiting.
- **Hop On Safely**: Wait until the bus completely stops and the driver says it's okay to get on.

Road Safety

- **Drive Slow**: Keep an eye out in the neighborhood for children and parents walking to bus stops.
- Stop for Buses: When a school bus is stopped with red lights flashing, all cars need to stop in both directions.

Stay Focused: No texting or distractions while driving, especially near schools and bus stops.

Pedestrian Safety

- Use Crosswalks: Always make sure to look both ways.

Johnson Road Bridge Update

Although we don't see much physically happening with the bridge, there is a lot going on behind the scenes. Following is what has happened so far:

- The Environmental Review is complete and has been submitted to HUD for approval. This could take up to three months.
- The Right-of Way for the utilities is complete. Spire, Spectrum, AT&T, Google, the City of Liberty and the water department all are responsible for relocation any line at their expense. Evergy does not believe that their poles are outside of the Right-of Way but if they are, the relocation costs would be borne by us. They are checking further.
- The city sewer lines could be an issue. We have submitted the drawings of the sewer lines for more evaluation. It is not clear if they will need to be relocated.

The new structure will be a 53' bridge to replace the existing 22' structure. Our old bridge was not built to current standards but the new standards with provide us with a stronger and safer structure. Part of the funding we are receiving will provide for sidewalks that will make it safer for pedestrians and motorists.

More to come as we progress. Please be patient as we go through this project.
